Head's desk

Despite a short half term we have been packing in lots of hands on learning for the children and taking advantage of the spring weather to work outside as much as possible.

At the beginning of term the Science Dome visited us. This involved filling our hall with an enormous inflatable dome in side which the children were treated to a planetarium experience suitable for their age and stage. See class pages for more details!





Another highlight for the children who participated was our success in the Cougars Football Festival on 29th April. Our roving reporter Tom reported:

'On Tuesday 31st April, Layston School Football Team played in the

Cougars Football Festival. We all arrived feeling very excited and were up against our rivals Millfield first! We kicked off and threatened to score immediately. Their

defenders tackled and hit us on the break. They got it out wide and a blocked cross leads to a corner which is well saved by our goalie. Goal kick taken and three passes later...GOOOAAAL. A well taken finish'.

We took two teams along to the festival, the Layston 'Aardvarks' and 'Beavers'. The Aardvarks won all three matches without conceding a single goal. Across the combined six matches, Layston lost just a single, close game which was a fantastic achievement. However, the highlight for most of the players actually appeared to be the free food afterwards!

All schools are allocated Sports Premium funding and it is a great pleasure to spend this on activities that not only promote skill development but also provide fun and challenge. The latest BMX course was a real hit with the children:

'Epic, awesome, fantastic and amazing'.

Darcy says 'I am learning to ride without stabilisers for the very first time'.





George tells us 'I'm learning how to use my bike in different ways. Now I am using both hands to break, plus it's a lot easier going on a mountain bike on grass.'

We have booked another session for our year 4's and a course of BMX for our current year 3's for the autumn term.

Developing links with our partner schools is always exciting and we were treated to an inspiring concert by the Edwinstree School orchestra, including a world premiere! Having the opportunity to see real instruments being played live is exhibitanting for

the children and supports their own efforts in learning the recorder (all children from Y2-4), the piano (lessons offered by a parent) and new to Y4 this term, the ukulele.

Maintaining and the fabric of the building and developing high quality outside learning spaces for our children is a priority. To this end we have scheduled work for resurfacing the area outside Y1 and Layston preschool over half term. This will be in a very smart dark green 'wetpour' surface providing a resilient but elegant solution to the existing but deteriorating substrate. We are hopeful we will all be delighted with the result.

As a Church school we encourage our children to show compassion and we have been delighted with the way the children want to raise money for charity. We have had several child initiated charity fundraising events, the latest of which, 'Arts and Crafts' stalls took place on 14th May for King George's Hospital. Some of our Year 4 children report:



'We made £126.00 by making homemade Arts and Crafts and ice pops. We set up stalls with the help of some of our families and we almost sold out! The ice pops sold out because it was a really hot day. We had to work as a team to organise

ourselves. We have learnt that you need to work as

a team to make sure you have enough things to sell. The sweet bags worked well and next time we would improve by having more time to organise our tables and lay our goods out before people come to buy'.

As a result of such enthusiasm we have set up a 'Charity Club' which will meet each Wednesday lunch hour with HT to plan, coordinate and organise future events.

We took off with Sally and learnt a lot of information about each one. It was great fun as we zoomed through space.

In our <u>RE lessons</u> we have discussed the meaning of the word Reverence which is our school value for this half term.

We have also discussed the Holy Trinity and how God is seen in 3 parts, God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. We made trinity decorations for our classroom prayer tree and also for our new whole school Holy Trinity display.



After half term we will be moving on to our topic of The Great Outdoors where we have lots of exciting activities planned. We will be practising for sports day, talking about the outdoor spaces around us and also organising a special 'adventure' evening.

We've been up to lots of interesting things in Year 3 this month!

We learnt about different states in science by making cornflour slime, which has some very interesting properties, as the children have explained below.

"The ingredients were cornflour, water and food colouring" - Ella.


"We had a lot of fun. When you applied pressure it went hard. When you stopped it went into liquid. It felt slimy and mushy in your hand" - Paddy.

Having enjoyed our morning learning about space inside the Science Dome, we later went outside to get an idea of the relative distances between the planets (and dwarf planets) in our solar system. After showing the children the distances for Mercury, Venus and Earth, they estimated where Pluto would be, and it was a bit further away than they originally anticipated!



"We were learning the distance from the planets. At the start of the session we estimated where Pluto was. Surprisingly, it was at the goal post!" -Louie C.



"First we estimated where Pluto should go. Then we put them in a line using a tape measure. I was holding the end of the tape while Megan went along" - Finn.

We also created our own Pac-Man right angle checkers so that we could find different angles in the classroom.



We took advantage of the good weather by sharing the children's wonderful poetry homework outside on the amphitheatre. There should be photos in homework books for everyone that shared their work.



We also went outside to practise using the eight compass points which we have been learning. The children started in the middle of the field and had to find eight different hidden shapes by following the compass directions.











